

## Virtual Professional Development for Educators & Clinicians

Districts and health care organizations can supplement in-person training with online, on-demand practice in the virtual classroom or clinic simulator designed to help professionals rehearse and refine a variety of skills needed to effectively teach sex education or provide sexual health care to teens. <b>NEW Scenarios for Clinicians Providing Sexual Health Care</b>
1. Taking an Effective Sexual Health History with an Unengaged Teen Patient
2. Taking an Inclusive and Effective Sexual Health History with an Engaged Teen Patient
3. Using Inclusive Language When Talking About Sexual Behaviors with a Teen Patient

Research has shown that each educator needs three 10-minute practice sessions per skill in the simulator. Advocates can provide an instructional coach to offer real-time feedback in the classroom simulator and/or to provide on-going technical assistance and follow-up support. Additionally, educators can use the simulator individually or in trios. There is greater impact if educators rehearse their skills individually, but for large districts and/or limited budgets, teachers can be grouped into trios to rehearse the same skill and observe their colleagues' rehearsal as well.
